12 Reasons to Ride A Motorcycle Jacob Black

There's a good chance that if someone has to ask you why you ride a motorcycle, they'll never really understand. For most of us, we ride because we can't not ride. It's who we are. It's why we are. This though, is the internet, and on the internet we make lists and explain things. So here are 12 reasons you should ride a motorcycle.

1. To be Cool

Motorcycles are cool. Period. They tell the world, "I live my life large! I laugh at fear, I am adventurous!" Everyone who sees anyone on any bike thinks that person is cool. This is very true for kids, and slightly less true for in-laws—but even they are still secretly impressed. Unless you ride in sandals or flip flops, or without a helmet – then you look silly.

2. To Find Your Zen

On a motorcycle, your thoughts are occupied by the moment, and only the moment. In that moment you feel very, very big and at the same exact moment, you are very well aware that you are also very, very small. Those two concepts collide in your mind simultaneously, and that is why we have that look in our eyes. We see the universe for what it is and transcend reality.

3. Commuting Is Easier And More Fun

Sitting in traffic sucks. But it sucks a lot less if you live in one of the states that allow lane splitting. Even if you don't, I guarantee your run through traffic will be faster, more enjoyable and more rewarding than if you were stuck in a car listening to news reports. People who arrive at work and take off their helmet are 1,000 percent more like to be smiling than people who arrive in a Dodge Journey.

4. You Learn About Perspective

Set your sights further down the road. Look where you want to go. Be aware of your surroundings. Live in the moment. The solutions to most problems we encounter on the road while riding are the same as the solutions to most of life's problems. Look further down the road when you're feeling unstable and you'll be alright in the end.

5. You're Less Of A Drain On The System

Riding a bike is better for the environ-

ment than driving a car. You use less fuel. Your transport uses less resources to build. You take up less space. You even take less of a toll on roads and infrastructure. Motorbikes as a single-person (or two-person) transport are far more efficient. Motorbikes are generally also cheaper to buy, operate, and maintain than a car.

6. A Motorcycle Can't Be Hacked (Yet)

Okay, so we're taking creative license a bit here because even cars can't be hacked really—there have been some stunts online but all of them required someone having physical access to a vehicle at some point. We know, however, that the march of autonomous technology continues to advance and invade our driving experiences. While that technology is finding its way into motorcycles, (Harley-Davidson developing group-riding cruise control for example), it is a lot harder to divorce the organic component from the equation when it comes to riding a bike. Take that Cyberdyne!

7. Because Authenticity

Even the most basic, universal, and utilitarian motorcycles are a reflection of their owners' personality. In a sea of SUVs, a motorcycle is the last bastion of automotive authenticity. A bike is as individual as a vehicle can be, and no two are ever alike. There's also an inherent simplicity to a motorbike and that allows you to create a deeper connection. You work on it, tinker with it, and perform basic maintenance on it almost daily, forging your bond with your machine.

8. Your Health Will Improve

A study once found that a motorcyclist in traffic makes more decisions per minute than a fighter pilot in a dog fight, or a race-car driver engaged in a battle of position. There are numerous medical journals that show a link between increased brain activity and long-term cognitive function. In short, a bike is good for your brain. Many people who struggle with depression and other mental health issues find motorcycles therapeutic. If you also ride off-road or race, you will likely increase your physical fitness as well.

9. You Meet the Nicest People
Every time you wave at a fellow rider,

Every time you wave at a fellow rider, a little smile fills your soul. Most of my best mates are people I met through bikes. Whether it's riding, talking about

riding online, racing, or just plain perving on bikes, some of my favorite people are bike people. They'll help you work on your project. They'll help you move house. They'll take care of you and your stuff when you wipe out. In short, bike people rule. Bonding over any shared joy will always lead to rewarding, fulfilling friendships but I argue that few hobbies bring people from so many backgrounds together the way riding can.

10. Because Freedom Baby!

A motorcycle can take you a lot of places a car can't, but that's a very superficial concept of "freedom". Really, a motorcycle gives you complete and total autonomy and agency over your decisions. Twist the throttle, weight the peg—your actions are yours and yours alone. You can't even reach your cell phone. Your distractions are non-existent. It's bliss...

11. Connection To The World Around You

In a car, you're driving through the world, letting it pass you by. On a bike, you're immersed in the world around you. Its sights, its sounds, its bug splatter. When you ride on the streets, you're a human like the other humans, not a cage. You have an identity and a connection to the world that you can't get from inside a car.

12. Because It Is Totally Rad.

That's it in a nutshell. You should ride a bike because not riding a bike is never as good as riding a bike. Ever. Motorcycles are fun, exciting, stimulating, and sexy. They can be fast, or slow, or big, or small, but a motorcycle is fuel for your soul. You can ride any way you like and get unfathomable amounts of joy. Whether you are knee down on a racetrack, carving a wooded trail, or just cruising down the highway with your head high and your smile wide... motorcycles are life.



Legislative Director's Ramblings

Howdy everyone –We, CMT/ABATE, Incorporated are an advocacy group for Tennessee motorbike riders since our initial founding and our mission remains that we work as a team for the rights, safety, and freedom of Tennessee motorbike riders. Faces and names may have changed – the core mission remains the same.

There has been a shift of leadership in the Tennessee House of Representatives. What does this mean for us? At the moment I think it is neutral and does not impact our mission for better or worse. It's perhaps meaningless unless there are changes to House committees and subcommittees and I doubt that will occur – at least for the short term. The Senate is not affected and I certainly expect no changes there.

A "hand's free" law passed last session half and enforcement began during July with members of law enforcement urged (but not required) to write warning cita-

tions rather than citations with applicable fines. In most areas of the State where reports are available the number of citations issued appears small to very small. People are either behaving themselves or becoming better at avoiding detection. Although the last part of that sentence is negative in a manner of speaking, perhaps some people are looking around while they attempt to drive impaired and break the law. Will we see a drop in the number of accidents caused by this form of impaired driving? Perhaps, but it may require at least two years of data.

Speaking of impairment, most of you know that we have a two-fold program of "Look Twice - Save A Life" and "Don't Ride Fried" made possible with grants from the motorcycle safety operations administered by the Tennessee Department of Safety. During July we received a grant worth \$20,000.00, and only after a lot of effort by members of the Safety & Education committee during a six month period did this come to fruition. In past years we have obtained an annual grant as large as \$50,000.00, yet during recent years the administration has made it very difficult to even obtain a \$5,000.00 grant so this is a small victory. Yet, a new list of grant request rules is proposed and it appears to be very tough to qualify for more than a \$5,000.00 amount - more on this at a later date.

I keep hearing about the dangers of grass clipping on our highways and that we should "do something" about it. I don't see grass clippings on the roads in

my AO but I do sometimes see wet and greasy tobacco stalks during the August and September harvest. I am long aware that littering of any type is a chargeable offense in Tennessee and below I added a part of TCA 55-8-170:

Tennessee Code 55-8-170 – Putting glass, nails and other substances on highway prohibited — Penalty


- (a) No person shall throw or deposit upon any highway any glass bottle, glass, nails, tacks, wire, cans or any other substance likely to injure any person, animal or vehicle upon the highway.
- (b) Any person who drops, or permits to be dropped or thrown, upon any highway any destructive or injurious material shall immediately remove the same or cause it to be removed.
- (c) Any person removing a wrecked or damaged vehicle from a highway shall remove any glass or other injurious substance dropped upon the highway from the vehicle.
- (d) A violation of this section is a Class C misdemeanor.
- (e) [Acts 1955, ch. 329, § 70; T.C.A., § 59-871; Acts 1989, ch. 591, § 113.]

You may notice that I underlined "any other substance" and am fairly sure that these three words apply to grass clippings, tobacco stalks, mud, or any other rubbish tossed onto the highway. I do not see the word "willful" so the establishment of "intent" is not required to charge a guilty party with a Class C misdemeanor - words that I also underlined. Currently, Class C misdemeanors currently have a punishment of a \$50.00 fine and/or up to thirty (30) days in jail. So yes; tossing/ blowing grass clippings on our highways is a chargeable offense regardless of who is doing it. Past this, for law enforcement to become engaged someone must file a complaint.

I am closing with the same thought as I did last month. I encourage all of the Local Charters to step up their revenue events to build our Treasury. We must cover the operating costs of our Organization 100%, and any 2020 legislative efforts will require even more funding.

Just a little bit of "information... Good News & Bad News

As the MRF Rep for Tennessee, I get a lot of e-mail updates from other States as well as Washington DC. Sometimes there's some encouraging news, and sometimes the reports are a bit disappointing.

A recent report out of Washington informs us that the latest list of recommendations from the National Transportation Safety Board does not include any discussion of helmet laws, and does ask the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to specifically include motorcycles in the development of performance standards for passenger vehicle crash warning and prevention systems.

We'll take that as a step in the right direction – If automated systems are coming to our roads, it's a good idea for them to be able to recognize and avoid us on our motorcycles.

Missouri had a rather large disappointment when their Governor vetoed the bill that included a helmet law modification. The Freedom of the Road Riders in Missouri had put a lot of effort into passing that bill. However it was a larger bill that the helmet modification was only a part of, and apparently there were some parts the Governor could not accept, and the helmet modification went down in flames with the rest of the bill. I think a lot of us here in Tennessee can "feel their pain" on this issue.

The Motorcycle Profiling Resolution H. Res 255 is still slowly moving forward, with 64 cosponsors from 26 States and one territory (American Samoa). Unfortunately, none of our Representatives from Tennessee have signed on as a cosponsor yet. A call or e-mail from you to your US Representative may be enough to get Tennessee added to the list of States with a cosponsor for this resolution.

Let's use this information to our advantage. Celebrate the good news, but don't let down our guard — NTSB has targeted motorcyclists in the past. Learn from the failure that Missouri experienced to see if it may help us in our next fight. And take action on issues that are important to us in maintaining our rights to...



RPM Act to be Introduced

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation was invited to participate in a working group with the Specialty Equipment Manufacturers Association (SEMA) and a host of other organizations about the future of the Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports Act (RPM Act). As we have reported in the past, we were unsure if this legislation would be introduced in the 116th Congress since the political appetite has changed on the hill. During the last Congress, the House version was able to gain 150 cosponsors but never made it to the floor for a vote, and the Senate version with its 39 cosponsors suffered the same fate in the waning days of 2018.

The MRF anticipates that this legislation will be introduced in the coming weeks before Congress adjourns for their August recess. Please be ready for any future calls to action that may find their way to your inbox.

NTSB Releases 2019-2020 NTSB Most Wanted List of Transportation Safety Improvements

The National Transportation Safety Board released its 2019-2020 Most Wanted List earlier this week. After reading the 28-page document, the MRF found that motorcycles only gathered the attention of the agency twice but thankfully not as a stand-alone issue like in years past. The two areas where motorcyclists are mentioned are:

1) End Alcohol and Other Impairment in Transportation
TO THE NATIONAL HIGHWAY TRAFFIC
SAFETY ADMINISTRATION:
Examine the influence of alcohol and other drug use on motorcycle rider crash risk compared to that of passenger vehicle drivers, and develop guidelines to assist

states in implementing evidence-based

strategies and countermeasures to more

effectively address substance-impaired motorcycle rider crashes.

2) Increase Implementation of Collision Avoidance Systems in All-New Highway Vehicles

TO THE NATIONAL HIGHWAY TRAFFIC SAFETY ADMINISTRATION:

Incorporate motorcycles in the development of performance standards for passenger vehicle crash warning and prevention systems.

After years of motorcycles being forgotten in other Department of Transportation guidance on autonomous vehicles, we are pleased that the NTSB is sending a directive to NHTSA to make sure motorcycles are included in autonomous vehicle standards.

Focus Groups

This week the Governors Highway Safety Association released a report on "Motorcyclists' Attitudes on Using High-Visibility Gear to Improve Conspicuity." Needless to say, the conclusions listed below by this taxpayer-funded study can be filed under the category of obvious and predictable.

Conclusions:

Eighteen focus groups with 137 motorcycle riders in California, Maryland, Michigan, and Texas were conducted to explore motorcyclists' attitudes toward wearing high-visibility gear to increase conspicuity. In most groups, only one or two participants said they regularly wear high visibility gear

Based on the focus group discussions, several factors emerged as barriers to motorcyclists' use of high-visibility gear. The most important involves the appearance of the high-visibility gear. It is judged as unappealing by some riders, and many riders are concerned that the look or style of the gear does not fit in with their riding culture. These factors work against the acceptance of high-visibility gear, even though many riders believe such gear may be effective for increasing conspicuity.

Many participants thought that motorcycle-riding culture would have to change for riders to adopt high-visibility gear, due to the association of novice riders and older riders with high-visibility gear.

Another barrier to the use of high-visibility gear is riders' skepticism that high-visibility apparel provides enough of a safety benefit to warrant its use and cost. Evidence that demonstrates the safety benefits of high-visibility gear is important to convincing motorcyclists they would personally benefit from using it.

In addition to adverse feelings about high-visibility gear itself, many participants expressed the belief that high-visibility gear would not improve safety, largely because of the perception that motorists are distracted anyway. In fact, several participants suggested that the onus should be on drivers to look for motorcyclists.





THINK YOU ARE HAVING A BAD DAY?

A man was working on his motorcycle on his patio and his wife was in the kitchen. The man was racing the engine on the motorcycle when it accidentally slipped into gear.
